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#### TRUSTEES' REPORT

#### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2020

The trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 30 September 2020.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the church's trust deed, the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable to the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) published on 16 July 2014.

#### Structure, governance and management

The use of the church's building was established by a charitable trust deed on 30 July 1885. It has a Constitution which was adopted on 5 September 1998 and amended on 22 September 2008.

The trustees (also known as Elders and Deacons) are appointed by church members by a vote at a church members' meeting.

The members of the church appoint Elders, who may be employed, to oversee the spiritual well-being of the church, and Deacons to oversee practical and administrative matters.

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the church is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

#### Objectives and activities

The church's objects are to glorify God through the proclamation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the inhabitants of Poplar, and to build up of those who are believers so that they may grow to maturity in their understanding and obedience to the Word of God. The church also supports missionaries working overseas and gives assistance to those who are in financial hardship. The policies adopted in furtherance of these objects are to preach the Word of God, to pray, and to encourage believers to build each other up. There has been no change in these during the year.

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the church should undertake.

For the first half of the financial year the church held services of worship on Sunday mornings and afternoons, pre-service prayer meetings on Sundays, Sunday school for children on Sunday mornings, fortnightly services in a local old people's home on Sunday afternoons, prayer meetings on Monday evenings, and once a month on Saturdays, Bible studies or home groups on Wednesdays, regular door to door visiting on Thursday evenings, monthly open air meetings at a local market, open air meetings in Central London at various times, and other visitation and counselling sessions at various times.

During the second half of the financial year activities were severely disrupted due to the COVID pandemic which started in March. During the first lockdown all meetings were held on-line. In July 2020 just the morning service resumed in person, and all other meetings carried on being held on-line for the rest of the financial year. The time away at Letton Hall had to be cancelled.

Up until the start of lockdown, preaching on Sunday mornings consisted mainly of a series of sermons from Paul's letter to the Romans. From March 2020 until the end of the financial year preaching was on various subjects arising from the COVID crisis.

#### Achievements and performance

In September 2019 Paul Pomeroy, who is training with London Seminary, started working with the church part-time. He has greatly assisted with preaching, pastoral visiting, evangelism and youth work. In January 2020 a Christian lady who lives locally started attending, with her adult daughter who seemed to have been restored from having been backslidden. Around this time a couple whom we have known for many years, and with whom we had been doing Bible studies, also professed faith.

As previously mentioned, the activities of the church were severely disrupted due to the COVID pandemic. However, one good thing that came out of COVID was the introduction of a daily prayer meeting on-line. This was attended by between 6 and 12 people most days. Some who had not been involved very much in the prayer life of the church up till this point became regular attendees at this meeting. Another good thing that came out of COVID was an on-line link to the home village Pakistan from which one of our members comes. We were able to do on-line regular Bible studies with the village elder and his son, the niece and father of our church member, and a Moslem friend of hers.

During the period when the church was open for services in the summer of 2020 two Portuguese ladies started attending, with their teenage and adult children. They seem to be settling into the church and finding spiritual help.

#### Financial review

During the year total income was £64,477 of which £5,232 was restricted. Total expenditure was £62,452 of which £4,254 was from restricted funds. The total funds balance at the end of the year, standing at £39,012, showed a rise of £2,025 over the period.

Unrestricted funds rose during the year by £1,047 to £34,892. During the year, the trustees decided to set aside £2,000 from general funds to the designated fund for ministry work in Sicily.

Cash offerings during the year were lower, probably as a result of there being no meetings at the church building for a while. Nevertheless, the income of the church held up remarkably well, and giving via Stewardship increased. Also, because of the lockdown there were savings in utility bills, and there were other savings in expenditure. Thus the church was able finance the cost of employing Paul Pomeroy as a part-time trainee pastor, and the cost of a new boiler in flat 2a without seeing a fall in unrestricted funds during the year.

#### **Reserves Policy**

The trustees have established a policy whereby unrestricted funds held by the Poplar Baptist Church is greater than £10,000. At this level the trustees feel that they would be able to continue the activities of the church in the event of a significant drop in funding.

As at 30 September 2020, the unrestricted funds were £34,892. This is £24,892 greater than the policy requirement.

# TO THE TRUSTEES OF POPLAR BAPTIST CHURCH FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2020

I report on the accounts of the church for the year ended 30 September 2020, which are set out on pages 4 to 11.

#### Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

#### 1 Accounting policies

#### 1. Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable to the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) published on 16 July 2014.

#### 2. Incoming resources

Income is credited in the accounts when received.

Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised when the amounts are received. It is added to the same fund as the related net donation.

#### 3. Resources expended

Expenditure is charged in the accounts when a liability to make payment is incurred.

#### 4. Accumulated funds

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the accounts. Funds designated for a particular purpose by the elders are also unrestricted.
